Camps for Kids with Epilepsy SUBSIDIES AVAILABLE

Camps are a great way for children with epilepsy to develop social and leadership skills, increase independence, and explore new activities.

The BC Epilepsy Society provides financial subsidies to help cover the costs of various camp programs. These are for children who need extra support due to medical needs and learning or physical disabilities.

The subsidies reimburse camp costs up to \$150 and are awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. Recipients must be a current member of the BC Epilepsy Society to be eligible.

Subsidies are provided for <u>BC Easter Seals Camps</u>, <u>Eureka Camp</u>, <u>Zajac Ranch</u> and various adaptive day camps such as the ones offered by <u>PosAbilities</u>, <u>Kids Matter</u>, and <u>Summer Social</u>.

Human Stem Cell Research Shows Promise For Treating Epilepsy

Researchers at the University of Florida have been testing the viability of using stem cells to help treat epilepsy. A researcher explained, "We took a cell line of human neuro stem cells and transplanted them into newborn mice to see how well they would develop into functional neurons in the mouse brain." Advanced Imaging and Seizure Detecting Machines at Surrey Memorial Hospital

A new 3T MRI (magnetic resonance imaging) machine and a MEG (magnetoencephalography) machine is coming to Surrey Memorial Hospital. The MRI being installed is the most advanced model of MRI machines. It takes extremely detailed images of the brain. The new MEG machine will be the first of its kind in Western Canada. This machine is used to find where in the brain that seizure activity is coming from. Installation of the equipment is expected to be finished this year. Click here to read more about this news.

Acetazolamide Medication Shortage

There is currently a Canada-wide shortage of acetazolamide (this medication was previously marketed under the brand name Diamox). If you or your child take this medication, please ensure that you currently have at least an eight week supply. Contact your neurologist immediately if you are unable to renew your prescription. This medication is expected to be back in pharmacies by mid-July.
